The Audition

A Short One-Act Comedy By Stafford Krause

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CAST OF CHARACTERS

Announcer

John Hadsell: Director of upcoming play to be presented by The Old Time Players of Comfort Assisted-Living Home.

Agnes Smyth: Actress wishing to audition for the upcoming play.

TIME AND PLACE

The present time on the Comfort Assisted-Living Home auditorium stage. There is a table with two chairs and a pencil and pad on the table.

The Audition

(ANNOUNCER appears in front of the curtain)

ANNOUNCER

Things have not been going well of late for The Old Time Players of the Comfort Assisted-Living Home. Age and accidents have taken their toll... with recent several knee and hip replacements and untimely accidents just days before their last shows.

(ANNOUNCER exits and CURTAIN RISES on the auditorium stage. JOHN is seated at the table downstage center. AGNES enters downstage left and approaches him)

JOHN

May I help you?

AGNES

Yes, I'm looking for where they're holding the tryouts for the new Old Time Players play.

JOHN

You've come to the right place. We're holding auditions here today. (... standing and extending his right hand) I'm John Hadsell, Director of the play.

AGNES

(... shaking John's hand) I'm Agnes Smyth. I'm so glad to meet you.

JOHN

Same here. Were you thinking of auditioning for a part in the play?

AGNES

Yes I was. I'm so excited to find a theater group here at the home. This is our first year here and I have missed my theater activities so much. I just love the greasepaint, the crowds... "Break a leg" and all that.

JOHN

Ah ! We don't use that expression around here anymore...

(pause)

But we're always interested in adding new talent to our Old Time Players group.

(... offering her a chair) Won't you have a seat?

(They BOTH sit down at the table)

JOHN

So you have been active in the theater before?

AGNES

Yes I've done just about everything there is to do in the theater. I've acted almost all my life and was the drama teacher at Hillside High in Hillside, California for almost 30 years.

JOHN

Oh. wonderful, wonderful.

(... picking up a pad and pencil)

Well, let me just get a little more information about you before we proceed with the audition.

Now your name is Agnes Smyth ... that's spelled S-M-Y-T-H?

AGNES

Yes that's right.

JOHN

We don't ask ages here ... but may I have your apartment number and phone number.

AGNES

We're in apartment 329 and our phone number is 520-423-9769.

JOHN

Great. Now I just have a few more questions. (*pause*) Have you ever broken your hip?

(... looking surprised)

Why ... no.

JOHN

How about your leg?

AGNES

No.

JOHN

Any hip or knee replacements?

AGNES

No.

JOHN

Do you use a walker, crutches or a cane?

AGNES

No. Why are you asking all these funny questions?

JOHN

Well, we have so many actors in our club that have broken their hips and such that we've had to adapt to it.

AGNES

What do you mean adapt?

JOHN

We have so many actors on stage with canes, crutches and walkers that it would look funny not to make things more uniform.

AGNES

Uniform?

JOHN

Yes. For the sake of consistency we decided that <u>all</u> our actors must use canes, crutches or walkers in our future plays.

Well that does seem a bit ... ah... different.

JOHN

May be so. But this has become so epidemic that Old Time Players had no choice but to adapt.

We even established a couple of new annual awards relating to this situation.

AGNES

Awards?

JOHN

Yes. There's the Hattie Johnson perfect timing award.

AGNES

Perfect timing award?

JOHN

Yes. We give this award to an actor in a current play who breaks his hip or leg within one week of opening night ... and is too incapacitated to perform in the play.

(pause)

Then there's the Joe Thomas reaching new heights award.

AGNES

Reaching new heights award?

JOHN

Yes. This is open to <u>any</u> member of Old Time Player who fractures his hip or leg <u>anytime</u> by falling from a height greater than 6 ft.

AGNES

(... looking dumbfounded)

Oh!

JOHN

Going on then ... Can you walk with a limp?

Well I suppose I could ... acting of course.

JOHN

Good. Good.

(pause)

Now if you do get a part in the play what type of medical device would you like ... a cane, crutches or a walker?

AGNES

Well I suppose that if I have to I'll take the cane.

JOHN

(... flipping to another page on his pad) Now let me see. (*HE pauses as if perusing information on the page*) Oh, I'm sorry. We're all out of canes. Would crutches be all right?

AGNES

(... really looking astonished and shrugging her shoulders) Well I guess so.

JOHN

Good. Good.

(... *flipping to another page on his pad*) I'll put you down then for our crutches orientation course.

AGNES

Crutches orientation course?

JOHN

Yes. We hold the course one hour before each Thursday's rehearsal. One must learn to swing on the crutches without hurting themselves or others.

And there are stairs on our sets that one must learn to go up and down safely.

You know ... Good foot <u>up</u> first ... bad foot <u>down</u> first.

(... totally confused) Good foot up first ... bad foot down first ???

JOHN

Well, that just about does it. Just one more thing and we can get on with the audition.

AGNES

What's that?

JOHN

(... *pointing upstage left*) Would you please walk over there.

> (AGNES walks, with a girlish swing to her hips, to where John has pointed. When she stops SHE looks back at John over her shoulder.)

AGNES

Is this alright?

JOHN

I'm afraid that won't do at all at Comfort Assisted-Living. (pause) But we do have several openings backstage.

CURTAIN
